Early FAFSA

- FAFSA becomes available October 1st of every year.
- The prior-prior years taxes are used to complete the FAFSA. For example, the 2019-2020 FAFSA will utilize 2017 tax and income information.

Summer 2019 Admits

- Summer 2019 admits should complete the 2018-2019 FAFSA for summer funding using 2016 tax information.
- The last day to complete the 2018-2019 FAFSA is **June 30, 2019**.
- Should also complete the 2019-2020 FAFSA for upcoming 2019-20 academic year.

Fall 2019 Admits

- Fall 2019 admits should complete the 2019-2020 FAFSA using 2017 tax information.
- Each institution establishes priority dates for the FAFSA to be completed.
 - **UCF FAFSA Priority Date is December 1, 2018**

Award Notifications

- Incoming Freshman award notifications
 - Email
 - Mail
- Award notifications for the 2019-2020 academic year can be sent as early as December 2018.

Award Notifications

- Award Notifications can include:
 - Undergraduate Admissions merit-based awards
 - HAS Pegasus Scholarship
 - Federal Aid (grants, work-study, loans)
 - Pell, SEOG, FWS, Subsidized and Unsubsidized Loans
 - Estimate Bright Futures Awards
 - Other State and/or Institutional Grants
 - UCF Grant, FSAG, UCF Scholars

Applying for Scholarships

- Students are strongly encouraged to seek out additional scholarship opportunities.
- UCF Online Scholarship Application:
 - A2O – Access to Opportunities
 - General application will match applicants to scholarship opportunities
 - Application is currently available for the 2019-2020 academic year

Scholarship Application Tips

- Establish a separate email account strictly for scholarship applications.
- Set aside a specific time to search and apply for scholarships
- Maintain a file that includes:
 - Names of the organizations and dates of involvement.
 - Leadership or volunteer experiences.
 - Awards and/or recognitions received.
- Have at least three different essays prepared.
 - Leadership and/or community service
 - Describe what inspired you to select your major/program of study
 - Explanation of why you deserve this scholarship

Scholarship Application Tips

- Apply for varying amounts
 - Larger awards can be more competitive and harder to receive
- Look for scholarships that can be used for more than tuition and fees.
- Start early!

Financial Aid Missteps

1. Not including the student's social security number on the admissions application
 - Impacts FL Prepaid, Bright Futures, and federal financial aid
2. Missing financial aid application deadlines
 - **2019-2020 FAFSA** - December 1st – UCF Priority Date
 - **2018-2019 FAFSA** (summer funding) - June 30, 2019
 - Submission of all requested financial aid documents
 - 2019-2020 Academic Year - May 30th – UCF Priority Date

Financial Aid Missteps

3. Completing the FAFSA incorrectly.
 - Blank is not a response
 - Answering dependency questions correctly
 - Using correct tax year information - **2019-2020: 2017 tax information**
4. Submitting incomplete/incorrect documentation or items the financial aid office did not request.
5. Failing to apply for scholarships.
6. Starting and/or completing the financial aid process too close to the start of the term.

Financial Aid Missteps

6. Not reviewing the status of their admissions and/or financial aid file on the university student portal regularly.
 - Residency documents
 - Final high school transcript
 - Citizenship documentation
 - Financial aid forms

7. Waiting well into the semester to complete the financial aid process.
 - Late fees
 - Dropped for non-payment
 - Late disbursement of aid
 - Possible poor academic performance

Financial Aid Missteps

8. Not knowing the renewal requirements of scholarships and other financial aid funding.
 - Bright Futures Scholarships
 - Institutional Merit-Based Scholarships
 - Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP)
 - Maximum timeframe to receive Pell and Federal Stafford Loans

9. Not knowing how much aid has been offered and if it will cover the expenses below.
 - Tuition and Fees (<https://studentaccounts.ucf.edu/tf-tuitionratescurrent/>)
 - Books/Supplies (<https://finaid.ucf.edu/applying/costs/>)
 - On-Campus Housing (<https://www.housing.ucf.edu/costs/rates/>)
 - Meal Plan (<https://ucf.campusdish.com/MealPlans>)

Financial Aid Missteps

10. Not taking a participating role in the process.

- Students should ask questions:
 - How will I purchase books/supplies at my institution?
 - Have I submitted ALL requested items to attend?
 - When will financial aid funds be disbursed?
 - What do I do if I don't have enough aid to cover my expenses?
 - What can I do if I don't meet the renewal requirements of my scholarship or financial aid?
 - Can my parents talk to financial aid/billing office without me being present?
