

#### FINANCIAL AID AWARDED AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CENTRAL FLORIDA

There are many ways to pay for college and many students use more than one type of aid. Financial aid is administered in the form of scholarships, grants, loans, student employment and waivers. Please note, a variety of factors impact students' financial aid packages. Financial aid awards are contingent upon student eligibility and availability of funds. The Office of Student Financial Assistance strives to provide students with the most comprehensive financial aid packages based on student eligibility and the availability of funds.

## **ANALYSIS**

#### FINANCIAL AID AWARDS

Financial aid awards are based on several factors. The information from the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), the University of Central Florida's Cost of Attendance (COA), and funding from various resources. Students are offered the maximum amounts available at the time awards are processed.

**NEED BASED AWARDS:** \$234,196,295.94


**NON-NEED BASED AWARDS:** \$368,958,804.49

97,545 FAFSA applications loaded





#### LOANS AWARDED

Educational Loans allow students and/or parents of dependent students borrow money to pay for educational expenses. UCF participates in the Federal Direct Loan Program, which offers low-interest educational loans administered through the U.S. Department of Education and includes the Federal Stafford, PLUS and Grad PLUS Loans. Students also have the option of exploring private educational loans. Loans are required to be repaid, usually with interest.

#### THIRD-PARTY PAYMENTS

Third-party payments includes vouchers, letter of credits, authorizations, tuition assistance (TA) forms, and other similar documents. If a student receives financial aid or another source of funding, the first payment posted to the student's account will apply to the charges. Once the secondary funding posts, the student may be eligible for a refund of any excess funding.

#### PETITIONS PROCESSED

The Office of Student Financial Assistance recognizes that households can experience changes in income or other finances that are not reflected in their information from two years prior. When these situations occur it is possible to re-evaluate a student's aid eligibility based on their current circumstances through the Professional Judgement (PJ) process.

Additionally, students who do not meet the Satisfactory Academic Progress standards for financial aid eligibility may submit Satisfactory Academic Progress Appeal.
